For our final term in Year 2 we have really enjoyed our Night Time theme; kick-starting the theme with a camping trip (on the school field!). We had a tent, barbeque, beans, hotdogs and s'mores. The children even did their own washing up before playing games. We used this camping experience to help us with writing a setting description. We thoroughly enjoyed 'The Owl who was Afraid of the Dark' chapter book to help us with understanding what a nocturnal animal is and how they are adapted to their habitat; using this knowledge to learn about food chains in our Science lessons. Since then, we have moved onto the book 'How to Help a Hedgehog and Protect a Polar Bear' This has helped us to think about how many habitats and species are endangered mainly because of our actions. We chose the 'beetle' as an endangered species to try and help. We have made two 'Beetle buckets' to provide a habitat for the beetle. We used our knowledge of our local area to choose a habitat that we could inform people about adventing people on what they can do to halp protect.

We have been so lucky to have Forest Schools once a week too which we have all really enjoyed. We have explored the physical geographical features through moving our bodies like tectonic plates as well as creating some explosive pieces of art. We have also thought about the human geography of these natural disasters and know how to stay safe in an earthquake. We imagined what it might have been like to have escaped the first eruption of Mount Vesuvius and have explained the experience through some brilliant informal letter writing. At home, lots of us chose to draw and build amazing volcano models and we had lots of fun making them erupt on the school field. Some of us chose to do our own research on different volcanos and we have enjoyed sharing our learning with the class.

Burghley children have worked SO hard over this final term and have shown amazing resilience. Thank you all for a fantastic year and I hope you have a very well-earned rest, ready for the new school year!

Our Science theme, 'The Earth and Planets', really engaged the children from the start. The unit began with them working in groups with large inflatable planets to try and work out the order of the planets from the sun. It was great fun and they almost got there! To help them remember they learnt a mnemonic: My Very Energetic Mother Just Served Us Noodles Mercury, Venus, Earth, Mars, Jupiter, Saturn, Uranus and Neptune. It was also fascinating to watch the rotation of the planets as they orbit around the sun. The children used an online "orrery" to observe these changes over time. From here we continued to use the inflatable planets to help explain the rotation of the earth while it orbits around the sun over the course of a year, and how its tilted axis gave us the seasons. Finally we explored what causes night and day and apparent changes to the sun. Tolethorpe Class, I have thoroughly enjoyed teaching you and I wish you all the very best as you embark on the exciting journey of Year 6. Keep working hard. Miss Watson.

MATHS Our times tables skills have been going from strength to strength through KS2 and many children are regularly logging on to TT Rock Stars at home to continue their practise and recall speeds. You are able to access TT Rock Stars over the holidays so please encourage your child to log on as often as possible and have some Times Table fun. By the time children reach the end of Year 4, they should be able to recall the facts for all the tables up to 12 x 12. The Studio game on TT Rock Stars allows children to gain a 'Rock Star' speed and be given a ROCK STAR STATUS ranging from Wannabe to Rock Hero. At the end of every game the children are given a speed, this is the average time it takes to answer each question in seconds. This then equates to a rock star status. Special mention needs to go to these children:

Hambleton: **TOBY** continues to be top of the 'rock star' pile in Hambleton with a recall speed of 0.69 seconds per question. Well done Toby.

Tolethorpe: **DANIEL** continues to be top of the 'rock star' pile in Tolethorpe with a recall speed of 0.52 seconds per question. Well done Daniel.

Woolsthorpe: **ELIN** is a new Woolsthorpe Rock Hero. Her recall speed is 0.64 seconds per question. Well done Elin.

Burghley: **OLIVIA** is a Burghley Rock Legend with a recall speed of 1.02 seconds per question. 


