This term, the Ethos Council focus has been on worship in school and Church. At the start of Christmas holidays, some children did a Bible reading in a special service at church, which told the story of Christmas from its beginnings in the Old Testament as well as the more familiar story in Luke's Gospel. Once back in school in January, the children supported Rev Jo in leading worship for Epiphany, which, due to Covid, was recorded for the rest of the school to join in with in their classes. Their most recent involvement was actually in church for Candlemas on 2^{nd} February with the whole school (in two separate services). The Councillors shared the reading of the story of Simeon and Anna in the temple, read prayers and lit candles. At the start of February they had an opportunity to take part in a day's conference via Zoom with 16 other schools from Peterborough Diocese, learning about pupil leadership of worship. The

children came up with an action plan which we will start working on in Term 4. The aim is that they will feel confident to plan and lead some of our worship each term on their own. It has been a real pleasure working with these fantastic children who are both committed and enthusiastic. Thank you for all your efforts and commitment Ethos Councillors.


CHARITY

Belvoir News It has all been about 'Snow, Frost and Ice' this term in Belvoir We began our adventures by class. listening to the story 'Lost & Found' by Oliver Jeffers. We wondered what would we do if a penguin turned up on our doorstep? Find out where it came from and return it of course! We discovered that penguins live at the South Pole, we got very busy planning what we would pack for a journey to the South Pole. We came up with lots of very practical ideas such as a roof for the boat!! We moved on to a story called the 'The Great Explorer' by Chris Judge, this was all about a boy called Tom, who's dad goes missing in the North Pole. We really enjoyed the adventure that Tom went on to reach his dad, across the seas and into the icy terrain of the North Pole with icebergs, blizzards and enormous Artic creatures. This time we planned out what our boat would look like and built our very own models and then made a list of the most important items to take with us on the boat. We were very lucky to get our own frosty days this term, we really enjoyed exploring the ice and the patterns in it, we also wondered why it melted in some places and not others? We set up experiments to see if we could freeze different things in the ice overnight, and we were delighted to see them frozen solid the next! Now how do we get them out...?

Tolethorpe News

This half term in Tolethorpe, we have been emerging deep down into the vast rainforest. We have become immersed in our theme 'I'm a year 5 get me out of here'. We have already learned an incredible amount through lots of investigation. We are now growing into intrepid geographers and scientists and have been finding out more about this incredible planet; we've worked out why the rainforests of the world are located where they are and what their climates are like. Using this knowledge and curiosity, we have written a formal letter to our Local MP to ask for their help; we're now waiting anxiously for a reply. The children have also been writing to persuade; thinking about persuasive features and language to use within a letter.

Our Maths has been exceptional this term as we have become very resilient learners, developing our written skills of multiplication and division, expanding our abilities to problem solve as well as in reasoning. We have started to delve deeper into fractions, linking these to our real life, including why they are of importance.

In Guided Reading we have really enjoyed reading 'The Explorer' by Katherine Rundell, following the antics of four children, as they try their best to survive in the Amazon Rainforest! In PE they absolutely loved learning to play Boccia, which involved lots of tactics and new techniques. They have also loved our rainforest themed Performing Arts this term, really exploring ways of expressing themselves through Dance and movement. Another fantastic term in Year 5 completed! Sporting Updates Our House Captains have continued to work through their development project as Sports Ambassadors – working towards the Bronze Level Award which they hope to achieve by the end of the academic year. Next term they will be focussing on what can be put in place in noncurriculum time to make sure that we are all meeting the minimum 1-hour physical activity time each day (30 mins of this in school outside of the curriculum). Afterward we plan to set up our own museum with our very own descriptions about each toy. Our Science lessons investigating different materials and our DT puppet making have also been memorable highlights of our learning this term. When we turned our hands to writing stories for year 1we found out we were really good! We presented them with our superhero stories for them to enjoy in a special big book.



Belton News

This term, Belton Class have been on safari to Africa! We have been exploring where Africa is, what it is like to live in different areas of Africa and how they are similar and different to ours. We have explored physical geographical features and animals that are found in Africa, loving every minute! We have planned Safari journeys for Beebots to see as many of the animals as they can. We used compass settings and directions to find our way through the savannah! In English, we have studied Handa's Surprise, identifying nouns, adjectives, question marks and capital letters. We worked really well innovating this story to create our own versions and then read these to our parents on seesaw! Following this, we developed our knowledge of non-fiction features within nonfiction books. We then embarked on creating our own non-fiction books on chosen African animals after spending time researching facts using the reading site 'EPIC!'. In our Science learning, we all became biologists with a specialism in classifying animals. We are now leading practitioners in identifying mammals, reptiles, birds, insect, amphibians and fish! We can also explain our reasoning. We hope that our parents have enjoyed seeing our fantastic art creations on Dojo - we're very proud of our achievements. What a term we have had in Hambleton. We have been conquering mountains; learning all about Everest, writing biographies about Sir Edmund Hillary and even finding out all about the life of a Sherpa. Once again Woolsthorpe Wonders have outdone themselves with their amazing learning. This Term has been all about water: from our learning about rivers in Geography to 'States of Matter' in Science. Our whole class reader 'The Miraculous Journey of Edward Tulane' has been a huge hit with Woolsthorpe Class. This novel will be completed after half term when our writing will be linked to it. In Maths, we have continued to use our multiplication and division knowledge from before Christmas to help us with our Area and Fraction learning. Again, it is important that the children do continue to practice their times tables at home as they are an integral part of all the maths learning that will continue over the course of the year. In our Science learning we now know how solids, liquids and gases are formed and how the reversible changes occur. This has linked beautifully with our Geography theme of 'Water, Water Everywhere' which has included learning about the water cycle. Our learning in RE this half term has been about what it is like to be a Sikh in Britain. The children have had the opportunity to learn about the Sikh faith: where and when it started; their spiritual thinking and how and where they worship. This learning will continue into Term 4. Finally, I'd like to thank you for tremendous support with all the Home Learning that has had to continue over this term. It does mean a lot that the children continue with their learning and wondering even when at home.
